




Views of 18-30 year-olds on COVID-19 vaccinations

June-July 2021



Introduction

Healthwatch Cheshire have been keen to find out the opinions and experiences on the COVID-19 vaccination for people living in the Cheshire area aged between 18-30 years old.

Anecdotally, we were told that there could be some hesitation amongst some people in this age group to get vaccinated, and as they are the current cohort eligible for their vaccination, it is useful to explore their views on the vaccine. This enables us to feed back people's views and perceptions to those organising the COVID-19 vaccination process, in order to influence the messaging used in encouraging people to take up their vaccine.

Where people between 18-30 have already accessed their vaccine, we wanted to find our about their experience of the process, and their thoughts prior to getting their vaccine. By giving people the opportunity to share their views and experiences in this survey this helped us to gain a better understanding of what is going well, what could be improved and people's views on the COVID-19 vaccination process. The survey could be completed anonymously, and all comments are being used to influence the planning of the vaccination programme going forward.

We encouraged anybody aged 18-30, or anyone who knows somebody who is, to fill in our survey.

The survey had a quick turnaround of two weeks in order to provide timely information to those planning the vaccination programme. We received **130 responses** between 22 June and 6 July 2021.



Summary of findings

Who responded to our survey

- 130 responses to our survey
- 48 people didn't answer our demographics and characteristics questions.
- Of those that did, there was a fairly even split between the number of 18-25-year-olds and 26-30-year-olds responding.
- Respondents were predominantly female, with 50 women compared to 28 men.

Vaccine uptake

- 126 of 130 respondents had been offered the vaccine at the time of taking the survey.
- Out of 97 people who answered, 91 said had either had their first dose or intended to. 49 had had their second dose and 48 intended to.
- Positive comments included wanting to protect others, to feel less anxious about Covid, and a desire to get back to normal. Work or academic life also had a strong connection with getting vaccinated.
- The majority of people told us that they most trusted the NHS and health and care professionals as reliable sources for information about the vaccine.
- 21 of 130 people told us they did not want to have the vaccine or were unsure. Reasons include (full comments on slides 7 and 8):
 - Phobia of needles.
 - Sentiment that the risks of the vaccine outweigh the benefits as some in this age group don't feel particularly at risk.
 - Not enough information on short and long-term side effects, such as on fertility and pregnancy.
 - Sentiment that the vaccine is still in a trial phase.



Summary of findings cont.

Booking vaccine appointments

- The vast majority booked their vaccine after initially being contacted.
- The majority said they had been contacted by text or letter. 72% said that they had then booked their vaccination online through the NHS website.
- 85% of people who had booked their vaccine told us it was an easy process. Those who had difficulties cited the availability of appointments to fit around work, not knowing their NHS number, and having to book both doses at once despite a lack of availability for their second dose as it was so far in the future.
- If given the choice, the most popular venues people would choose to receive their vaccine are a vaccination centre, GP Practice, pharmacy, or walk-in centre.

Experiences of the vaccine process

- Just over half of people who had had their vaccine had received the Pfizer vaccine, and just over a quarter had received AstraZeneca.
- Most people told us about friendly and welcoming staff, who looked after them well. People generally felt that they experienced a short waiting time and accessibility, both to and on the site of their vaccination was good.
- Some people told us that their experience was negatively effected by the logistics of getting a vaccine, such as parking, feeling that they waited a little too long to receive their vaccine, or appointments being far away.
- A small number of people reported pain, swelling or feeling unwell after their second dose of the vaccine.




Many people that we asked indicated that they had been offered the opportunity to get vaccinated through work, with some being in the health sector or in a caring role. A few people told us they had been contacted by their university or through a volunteering role. Most said that they had then booked their vaccination online through the NHS website. Work or academic life had a strong connection with getting vaccinated, within the responses to our survey.

Below are some of the reasons people told us they were unsure about being vaccinated:

- "Severe medical/needle phobia."
- "Don't feel like you should be forced to have something you don't want to have."
- "I've had my first vaccine but it was only after hearing about a pop-up clinic from a family member, I'd had no request or invite for the vaccine."
- "Not sure as worried about the effect on my health and wellbeing. Taking regular home test."
- "The risk of the jab far outweighs the benefits to someone at my age."
- "Not enough about side affects Fertility, Pregnancy."
- "Because is a trial phase vaccine and I don't want any health problem in the future because nobody knows what are the long term symptoms. By the way my immune system is 100% strong against this virus."
- "Cannot get an appointment close to me (and cannot travel) as I require a British Sign Language interpreter, the closest vaccination centre with this is 40+ miles away. I'm also concerned about how this affects reproductive health as women's reports of changes to cycles is being ignored and I am trying to get pregnant."






Are you going to, or have you had the vaccine? If no or unsure please say why. cont.


- "Reports of infertility, messed up menstrual cycles and heart attacks."
- "Unsure on the safety of the vaccine."
- "No evidence of long term side effects. New technology never been used before. Pfizer never had vaccine approved before. Risk management, risks of covid side effects vs vaccine side effects in younger age groups."
- "It's an experimental vaccine still in trials. No long term effects are known. Its already causing death and serious damage."
- "Unsure about the effects when having it in the future."
- "No long term safety data."
- "Experimental vaccine? No thanks."
- "I do not want the vaccine. I am extremely unconfident of the short term and especially the long term effects of the MRNA vaccine."
- "I am pregnant."
- "Don't like needles."
- "Due to side-effects (heart inflammation re Pfizer and blood clots re AZ and menstrual irregularities re both amongst others), I have had this very variant of the virus that these vaccines are made for (it was milder than a normal cold) and I do not consider myself in a risk group. In the States they have monitored spinal fluids and found everyone who has had the virus to retain the antibodies in their spinal fluid, so the immunity is there even if it's not circulating in the blood. In addition, I believe that the more the virus is curtailed, the more it mutates in order to survive, so it would be best to allow it to circulate amongst the young and healthy while vaccinating all the vulnerable and elderly people effectively and fully."

Did you find the process of booking a vaccine easy? If no, why not?

Below are some of the reasons people told us booking a vaccination was *not* an easy process:

- "There wasn't many appointments to fit my vaccine around work."
- "I couldn't get an appointment in Cheshire West at all, very bad. Went to Warrington."
- "I didn't know my NHS number. Was fine once I had got it from GP."
- "The first few times I tried to book, it kept cancelling as you have to book both appointments at the same time, but the date of my second dose was so far in advance that they didn't have any dates available yet."
- "It took a while to get an appointment near me."
- "Places far away."
- "There was nothing available locally."



Most people told us about the friendly and welcoming staff, who looked after them well. People generally felt that they experienced a short waiting time and accessibility, both to and on the site of their vaccination was good.

Some people told us that their experience was negatively affected by the logistics of getting a vaccine. For example, parking on site, not having a full understanding of the arrangements or feeling that they waited a little too long to receive their vaccine.

A small number of people reported pain, swelling or feeling unwell after their second dose of the vaccine.

People who responded 'Other' stated:


- "All vaccination staff members were very friendly."
- "Had my first vaccine at Ellesmere Port last Friday. So friendly and I didn't even realise it has been done as a nervous person."
- "Originally I had to book my 1st jab in Liverpool 16 miles away. A few days later a work colleague said they had booked in Chester so I amended my booking. But it would have been better if the site was up to date when you made 30-year-olds live."



If negative, please tell us why?

People who responded 'Other' stated:

- "Not accessible ground underfoot to the vaccination centre isn't ideal for someone who isn't stable under foot."
- "Unwelcoming environment I was advised for my 2nd dose to go into the actual GP Practice yet the lady behind reception was very passive and told me they didn't do vaccines there without even asking any of my information. Long story-short, I did have a vaccination booked in at the surgery."
- "Second dose was a long wait time."
- "Limited wheelchair accessibility."
- "Far away."
- "Despite having an appointment booked for 1.20pm, they were running a 'drop in' on the same day. There was no distinction between the two groups so I ended up waiting for an hour for my pre-booked appointment. I did not feel this was very good and appointments should have been honoured with walk ins slotted in where they could. Poor planning."
- "Felt really ill after the first dose and needed time off 6th form."
- "Painful second injection."
- "17 mile trip to Liverpool if I was not told the site had been updated."





If you could have a choice of vaccination centre, where would you pick?

The majority of people indicated that they would like their vaccination to be in a familiar local setting, such as their local GP, pharmacy or walk-in centre. However, many were happy with the common option of attending a focused, larger site, such as vaccination centres. Timing and availability was very important to respondents. 'Other' response included:


- "Nearest location to me."
- "Anywhere!"
- "Just whichever option is closest to my home or workplace."
- "Would always pick the one with the earliest appointment available, doesn't bother me where, expect I'd avoid a hospital."
- "I feel the GP surgeries in Chester have been a disgrace during covid and let us all down They could and should have done so much. And in this day and age people should be able to book GP and nurse appointments online and there should be weekend and at least 1 evening surgery till 10pm."

- "Want improved protection from the virus."

- "Immune system is enough."
- "Couldn't wait to be protected."
- "Personal protection from Covid."
- "Protecting the patients I care for."
- "Getting closer to getting back to normal."

- "I understand why it is vital that everyone is vaccinated."
- "Gives me peace of mind."

- "I want to feel protected and help protect those around me."





- "Worried about side effects."






How would you prefer to find out about information regarding the Vaccine?





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
What is your age group?






Gender identity - Which of the following options best describes how you think of yourself?




Gender identity - Is your gender identity the same as the gender you were given at birth?





Which of the following options best describes how you think of yourself?




